Writing Class Overview

How to help at home

- *Ask to read any of their writing that they are working on.
- *Encourage them to write when there is some free time. They can write/e-mail letters to family/friends, or tell them that they can persuade you to change a rule, or allow something if they write you a convincing persuasive piece.
- *Show them how to use e-mail.
- *Encourage them to practice their typing skills. (Kids have logins on (www.typing training.com)

Sample Standards We Address
